LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DDEADLINE for February Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, January 22, 2025, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel. Lujan@isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT IT'S COLD OUT THERE

Colder temperatures are here — it's time to protect your plumbing from the freezing temperatures. Sewer piping can freeze — especially underneath a modular home. Take time now to check your piping — both water and sewer lines. Any exposed water or sewer pipe should be protected with heat tape, insulation, or other means to help prevent the pipes from freezing. If you have a modular home, please ensure the skirting is in good condition and if there is no skirting, do what you can to protect the underside of the house from the cold.

Swamp coolers should be properly winterized. The water supply line should be removed from the spigot or frost-free and drained. Frost-frees should not be left in the open position; remove any hoses from the frost-free and close the frost-free. When left open, the frost-free cannot drain the water that is inside the unit. The frost-free is designed to drain itself when the handle is put in the closed position, which should prevent freezing.

Check the toilets in your home for leaks. A faulty flapper unit will allow water to continually flow through the toilet and right down the drain. If the home is on a septic system, the excessive water will saturate the leach field causing it to fail. If your home is on the main sewer service, the treatment facility will have to "clean" up the wasted water.

Check all the fixtures for leaks. Leaking showers, tubs, sinks, and toilets will waste water. Make repairs to leaking fixtures to conserve water, which is a precious resource. If you need help making repairs, contact Housing at 505-869-4153.

Public Works no longer has funding available to assist Tribal Members with repairs for services such as sewer back-ups, and water leaks on your service line or inside the home. The previous Tribal Council did not approve funding for services. We are hoping this will change in the future but as of right now, these services are not being provided.

Homeowners should know where the main shut-off is to their residence. Most homes have a main interior shut-off valve and everyone in the home should know where it is located. In the event of a water leak inside the home, shutting off the water quickly will prevent additional damage from occurring. Toilets and sinks should have isolation valves going directly to the fixture. Have you ever tested these isolation valves to ensure they work? It is much more convenient to shut off the fixture's isolation valve and not the entire home to make repairs.

Each residence should also have an exterior water shut-off. Locating this shut-off can be challenging. Housing employees may not know exactly where the shut-off's location is for every property on the Pueblo. Locating your exterior shut-off should be done now while it is not an emergency. Placing a marker of some type near the shut-off will save time in the event you have an emergency and need the water shut off as soon as possible. It takes time for a crew to be dispatched to assist you, especially after normal working hours. The employees need to get to the yard to get a work truck, drive to your location, and then begin searching for the shut-off device. All of which takes time. Meanwhile, water could be leaking inside your home causing additional damage.

Be prepared and protect your piping from the cold. Check the isolation valves at each fixture; and know how to turn off your water in an emergency. Locate and mark your exterior water shut-off - keeping in mind there could be snow on the ground.

Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility. When your recyclables are bagged in colored bags they are not opened up and your material is landfilled instead of recycled. Using clear bags helps to ensure the health and safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the recycle facility. Using colored bags will result in your recycles not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.



Transit Services Now Serving the Pueblo of Isleta

The Pueblo of Isleta and the Rio Metro Regional Transit District Working Together



Bus Route 208 (No Fares until further notice!)

Bus Route 208 connects the Pueblo of Isleta and Valencia County communities to the Alvarado Transportation Center (ATC) in Downtown Albuquerque during the morning/midday when the Rail Runner does not operate. Route 208 features three northbound trips arriving at the ATC at 9:30am, 11:00am and 1:30pm, and three southbound trips departing the ATC at 9:35am, 11:05am and 1:32pm. At the ATC, riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes.

Route 208 serves two bus stops on the Pueblo of Isleta. The stop closest to the village proper is located on NM 147 just east of the Rio Grande Bridge. Please do not park and leave vehicles unattended on the adjoining roads near this stop, as the bus and other vehicles use these roads to turnaround and access other locations.

Route 208 also stops at the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station, where riders can transfer to the Isleta Resort and Casino shuttle. Because the bus serves the station, riders can



also consider using Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque in the mid morning and returning by train in the evening.

Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride (No Fares until further notice!)

The Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride operates Monday through Friday from 8:15am to 2:45pm, providing trips within the Pueblo and to the ABQ RIDE Route 53 bus stop on NM 314. Service to places like Smiths, Albertsons and Wal-Mart in Los Lunas is also provided with requests made before noon at least one business day prior to your trip.

Request your Dial-a-Ride trip by calling Valencia County dispatch at (505) 352-3595 before noon at least one business day prior to your trip. Requests are accepted between 5:00am and 3:00pm Monday thru Friday. On the date and time of your trip, a wheelchair accessible van will arrive within 15 minutes of your scheduled pickup time. Trips may also be grouped together; riders should



expect to travel with others.

Schedules for Route 208 are also available at the Public Services Department Office at the Tribal Services Complex.

About Route 208

Bus route 208 provides three northbound and three southbound trips morning/midday between Valencia. County, the Pueblo of Isleta, and Downtown Albuquerque when the Rail Runner does not operate. Riders are encouraged to use Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, by taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque midday and returning by train in the evening. Weekdays only



Who are you, who do you want to be, and what are you working toward? Limiting the control social media may have on you!

Based on an article from the American Psychological Association on April 1, 2024, the average number of hours teens spend on social media apps is approximately 4.8 hours per day. "YouTube, TikTok, and Instagram account for 87% of their social media time."

On October 1, the Standing Rock tribe filed a complaint charging social media companies "with being a public nuisance, negligence and deceptive practices." (Standing Rock Tribe is latest to sue social media companies for alleged mental health effects, By: John Hult-October 3, 2024). The article indicates that there are a large number of youth in the Standing Rock community who are anxious, depressed, or suicidal.

We understand that the Standing Rock tribe is not alone, with similar lawsuits from the Fond du Lac Tribe in Minnesota, Spirit Lake Nation in North Dakota, and the Menominee Tribe in Wisconsin to name a few. In September 2024, the New Mexico Attorney General filed a lawsuit against Snapchat indicating there are not enough safety controls to ensure the safety of young people.


Our community does not remain unaffected by technology and the unlimited access it provides. Social media provides a space where you can connect and share with many beyond your imagination. Have you ever been at the dinner table with a phone vibrating or beeping while you are trying to have a conversation? Many find it challenging to put the phone aside for even a few minutes feeling that they must immediately react to the recent chat, text, or social media post. The recent lawsuits by tribes highlight the urgent need to address the negative consequences of excessive social media use.

As we move into the new year, reflect on your own usage of social media and the amount of time you spend using different applications. Social media is very influential and can significantly impact the daily lives of those who use it. Be mindful of how you let social media drive your decisions, don't let social media define you!



How Can We Protect Ourselves?
As individuals, we can take steps to mitigate the harmful effects of social

media:



Mindful Usage:

Be aware of the time you spend on social media and set limits. Make it a point to turn off or silence your phone at certain times of the day, especially when you are with others – show them you are respectful and present.




Critical Thinking:

Question the authenticity of information and avoid comparing yourself to others. Filters are often used in many social media posts, do not compare yourself to what's online. Focus on setting some healthy goals for yourself, where do you want to be in the next five years?

Digital Detox:

Regularly disconnect from technology to recharge and reduce stress. Take a walk outside, play with your younger relatives, spend time with animals, or just simply breathe in the outdoor air and take time to relax and reflect.



Healthy Relationships:

Prioritize real-life connections and limit virtual interactions. Visit your relatives, and ask them to share stories about their childhood. Make a meal together or help them with some daily chores.

Seek Support:



If you or someone you know is struggling with mental health issues, reach to a trusted friend, family member, health mental professional. There are many people in the community you can reach out to, don't hesitate to ask for help.



Tutoring of Other Supports

The tutoring program aims to support students in achieving academic success by providing one-on-one sessions. This semester math proved a popular subject for requested help. This ranges from math fundamentals up to algebra. This semester the Los Lunas Public School District has provided a credit recovery teacher. This specialized teacher will allow students to move more effectively and faster through their credit recovery. This unique opportunity supports students in graduating on time. The credit recovery teacher assists students from Los Lunas High School, Valencia High School, and Century High School. This program has created a larger high school audience within the tutoring program as shown by the **50.2**% of attendees being a high school student. The tutoring program has also offered support for Adult Education. If you or anyone you know is looking to earn their GED or HiSet the tutoring program is certainly able to help you achieve your goals. The month of October tends to be the month with higher attendance. Grading periods surround the month of October. October starts immediately after the first grading period has ended and the second grading period ends with October.

The Department is immensely proud of the dedication and resilience demonstrated by students this semester. Education is a shared journey, and our community's commitment to sharing in this journey is inspiring. As students return from break, the Department encourages everyone to take time to recharge and reflect on the incredible progress that has been made. Our wish is to continue to build momentum in the coming year.



From the Department of Education Academic Success Program

High School Students

Hope you all had a great holiday season! A new year means a new grading period with a fresh start and new opportunities to maintain good grades. The Department of Education has various ways to help you succeed in high school. It is all up to you to take advantage of the opportunities that are available, such as after-school tutoring, homework help, meeting with students and parent(s), and helping you advocate for yourself while in high school.

Attention **Los Lunas School District** parents, as the 1st semester grading period concluded in December it is important that you check your parent portal as report cards will not be sent out. If you don't have a parent portal and need to sign up, we can help you. You can also call the school and request your child's report card. If we have a release of information on file, we can request grades as well. If your student has failed a core class, credit recovery is available for your student to make up the grade. Credit recovery is a fee of \$50.00 and is reimbursable from the Johnson – O'Malley program. Signups are done

through the high school, after school, or through the Department of Education. If your student has failed an elective course, they can only make those up the following year within their daily schedule.

Albuquerque School District parents' 1st semester grading period ended as well in December. Please log on to Parent Vue to check your student's grades. Parent Vue also has an App that can be downloaded, if you currently do not have the app and would like our assistance, please reach out to our office. If your student has failed a class this semester, please reach out to your school for their options on how your student can make up the class. If there is a fee for your student to make up the class, that can be reimbursed from the Johnson – O'Malley program.

January also means that all of you graduating seniors only have 5 more months of high school experience. Let's make these last few months a memorable one, but also a successful one. If you are planning on continuing your education the Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is now open. Any students who wish to continue

their education and get funding from the Pueblo of Isleta must fill out this federal application as one of the requirements. This application can be found at https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa. If you are need assistance with this form, you may reach out to the Department of Education and we can assist you.

According to the US Census Bureau the official poverty measure in 2022 was 11.5% and at the time 37.9 million people were in poverty. The state of New Mexico is in the top five states for the highest poverty level.

There are several factors that contribute to poverty these include:

- Certain people including older adults and those whom have disabilities are more likely to suffer from poverty due to a fixed income
- Households where the head of household is a woman and those whose head of household is unemployed
- Adults without a high school diploma

There are several programs that can help these include SNAP, WIC, Medicaid, TANF, earned income tax credits, subsidized housing and energy assistance programs. There is also early education assistance and job training programs.



The Lujan Family would like to express its sincere gratitude for the love and support from family and our community during the loss of our eldest brother, Ted Lujan. Ted was a proud Father, Grandfather, Brother, and Uncle, but he was a Proud Marine!

in 1977. After completing boot camp, he signed up for Marine Sniper training, which he completed and officially became a Marine Corps Sniper. Ted carried out several missions in the Philippines and other countries. When his service came to an end, Ted was Honorably Discharged in 1981.

Upon coming home from Military Service Ted joined the Grant Police Department where he was employed for several years before moving to Valencia County Sheriff's Department. After several years with the Valencia County Sheriff's Department, Ted decided it was time for a change. Ted found his new home at Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department where he served approximately 15 years known by call sign BCSO155. Ted had just taken his Sargent's exam before going on vacation when tragedy struck the family in June of 1988 when Ted was involved in a horrific accident that put him in a wheelchair as a quadriplegic. During his stay at the Hospital Ted was informed by his Commanding officer that he had passed his Sargent's Exam. Despite the new challenges Ted had to face, severe depression, and thoughts of worthlessness, Ted never stopped fighting. Ted Retired from the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department as a sergeant. For the next 32 years, Ted accepted his fate with grace and gratitude never complaining. Ted then decided to attend the University of New Mexico (UNM) where he graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in psychology with a Minor in Sociology.

In the summer of 2018, Ted suffered a Stroke which left Ted slightly more paralyzed on his left side making it difficult to drive his wheelchair and his van. Slowly we noticed his speech had been affected as well. Ted decided to stay at the VA hospital to be cared for. Ted's stay at VA Hospital was all of six years when on October 30, 2024, at approximately 10:20 pm our Creator called Ted home to be with our parents, sister, and his daughter Jackie.

Ted is survived by his Granddaughter Brooklyn Lujan-Chaney, Brothers Kenneth and Paul Lujan, and his several Nieces and Nephews, Aunts, Uncles, and Cousins.

So very hard to believe 2024 is behind us and we are starting what hopes to be a successful and wonderful year for all. The department has undergone many positive changes over the past year, and looks to continue to progress in every aspect possible. We at the Isleta Police Department hope to continue to build a good working relationship with community members and outside agencies.

We have added another to our growing family and would like to introduce Officer Paul Thain who joined the department a couple of weeks ago.



My name is Paul Thain, and I'm originally from the United Kingdom. I immigrated to the United States in 2015 to become a police officer. I got my start in public safety in 2018 as a dispatcher, where I worked for

three years before transitioning into law enforcement. I was hired by the Bernalillo Police Department, where I spent three and a half years as a police officer.

During my time at Bernalillo PD, I became a field investigator, assisting detectives with severe crime investigations. I developed a strong interest in firearms and became a firearms instructor. My passion for police work also includes K-9 units. I've had the privilege of working with Sandoval County's K-9 teams on various narcotics cases and other service calls, which strengthened my admiration for their work and dedication.

In my free time, I enjoy practicing jiu-jitsu, honing my skills at the shooting range, and spending time with my family. I've recently started learning how to ice skate with my fiancée, which has been a fun new challenge. I'm also an outdoor enthusiast and love taking my dog on tough hikes to see how far we can push ourselves.

I am looking forward to working with the Isleta Police Department and meeting the members of the community.

A reflection and recap of the divisions and employees who contribute to the department are as follows:

RESIDENCY

A reminder to all, the Pueblo of Isleta Police Department, working closely with the Codes Compliance Officer, has been addressing the complaints of the community regarding residency. Please keep in mind we work diligently to enforce these codes and obtain the cooperation of those involved to follow the proper procedures in applying for residency status. Unfortunately, it does take time for the process as an application must be completed and submitted, followed by a background check, and upon completion, the packet is presented to the Governor's Office for approval or denial. A reminder, until these steps have all been completed, the applying party cannot reside on the Pueblo until receipt of acceptance or disapproval.

The sponsoring party can also face consequences if they allow the individual to reside at the home pending approval.

If denied residency, the individual may be allowed to visit but cannot circumvent the system by staying for several hours, leaving for a few hours, and returning at a later time. A visit is just exactly that, a visit for perhaps three hours, and these visits may occur consecutively during the week and alternate weekends. Again, this does not mean endless hours with a break in between and return again.

If you have questions, please do not hesitate to contact Codes Compliance Officer C. Eaton or Officer Sharon Mitamura at the Police Department.

With the many activities occurring from mid-December on, many of the highlights will be prepared and included in the February newsletter, but we all hope your holidays were enjoyed with friends and family.

IHSP TRAFFIC

This division has grown this past year with the promotion of J.P. Abeita to the position of Traffic Sergeant supervising four traffic officers who keep busy consistently through the year with not only duties of traffic enforcement, and investigations of crashes, but also assist with community events with traffic control. They also hold a required number of DWI Roadblocks and/ or saturation patrols. Also added to their duties organizing and participating in community events, as well as presentations not only here, but at conferences in other states.

We proudly had an officer complete and become certified as a Drug Recognition Expert which is highly advantageous when impairment is not restricted to alcohol alone.

Many thanks to this team for all of their involvement in the community and outside, as well as adding to the nationwide recognition of their accomplishments.

The U.S. Department of Transportation says that from now until New Year's, law enforcement sees the highest incidents of drunk driving, making the holidays the deadliest time to drive. From 2018 to 2022, close to 5,000 people died in alcohol-related crashes in December alone.

"Don't Shatter the Dream Mobilization" begins December 13, 2024, and runs through January 1, 2025. This mobilization was first launched in 2009 by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the program continues today. Tribal law enforcement will be conducting saturation patrols on tribal lands with the intent to save lives. The department asks if you are going to be celebrating and drink, DON'T DRIVE. Find a designated driver, take an Uber or other means of transportation.

NARCOTICS

Narcotics are in abundance everywhere around us and have filtered on to the reservation for some time. It has taken a toll on individuals here with addiction, overdosing, and even death. A concerted effort has been in play for quite some time and though successful, the problem with narcotics is far from over. CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

This division is composed of a sergeant and two investigators who have also risen to the challenges of criminal activity taking place on the reservation with connections to outsiders. The division effectively investigates all information/leads brought forth and has had success in charging individuals and following the cases through to prosecution.

Again, thanks to the hard work of this division.

BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES CLINICIAN

Another added position is that of the clinician who is kept busy networking with

multiple organizations to provide the best resources available to the members of the Pueblo. He has many years of experience and worked in different organizations and has brought insight into the problems faced by individuals and assisted in helping officers to recognize different aspects of mental health issues encountered.

Together with an officer designated to assist with follow-ups, etc., visits have been made to determine if the person needs additional resources, etc.

ISLETA POLICE COMMUNICATIONS

Another division that has increased in size and is trained to effectively assist the community, travelers, and anyone who needs assistance. They are the hub of communication from the calling party to the officers in the field and are trained to ensure sufficient information is gathered and broadcast to the assigned officer(s) to safely respond to these calls, provide additional resources when required, and document all aspects of the call. A stressful situation faced by them all, but handled professionally and efficiently and we thank them as they are the lifeline for the community and officers in the field.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

These are the individuals who handle

paperwork, preparation of reports, processing of new employees, ensuring discovery is completed and submitted, working with officers and the list goes on. The ladies who take care of all of the administrative paperwork, purchase requests, timekeeping, etc. are the hub of information that must be maintained and due an exceptional job. We thank you for your efforts and diligence.

COMMAND STAFF:

As a member of this department for 18 years, I have seen the changes some good, some not so good, but the strides taken and accomplished by this department this past year are more than worth mentioning. We are almost fully staffed in patrol, the teams mentioned above which have been created and/or expanded.

They have created a professional environment and work diligently to recruit and retain employees with requests for incentives they research and apply for. Their hard work is not unnoticed and the community and the members of the police department benefit from diligent efforts.

Just reflections from observations of a long-time employee of the Pueblo of Isleta Police Department.

With all of this said, you can be sure the Police Department and all of its divisions will continue to move forward in their efforts to protect and serve the community. There are challenges to be faced and the department will do its very best to meet those challenges.


Thank you for all taking part and being active when these events are sponsored for the community. As always, community is a big part of all the success of our departments as well as sharing the various ways that we support our families.


Upcoming






Did you know Isleta Health Center is your payor of last resort?



Did you know you have to call PRC to inform them of all appointments?

This includes all ER/urgent care visits, any follows ups, any secondary referrals, telemed appointments, rescheduled appointments. Not calling in for appointments will delay payment.

Did you know if you receive a bill from a provider, you have to bring it in to PRC, even if you have a referral?

Some facilities will send a bill to the patient but not Isleta Health Center. It is best to bring all bills in received by mail to make sure PRC contacts the facility to bill Isleta
