Governor's Report

Maguwam,

I hope this newsletter finds everyone in good health, as we approach into the month of March. As we enter into the farming and fire season, we would like to remind you to be cautious and burn your weeds responsibly to ensure the safety of our community.

In the early part of January, a meeting was held at the Court House to select the 2025 Mayordomos for this farming season. I would like to extend my gratitude to everyone who attended and to the Mayordomos who were selected to serve in this capacity.

My Lieutenants and I have been actively advocating for the Pueblo's interests in the 2025 New Mexico legislative session. In early February, we had a very productive meeting with Governor Lujan Grisham to discuss the Pueblo's state legislative priorities, including capital outlay funding, water rights, support for Native students, and support for law enforcement needs. We attended the 2025 American Indian Day at the Roundhouse and will continue to closely monitor the remainder of the state legislative session.

We've also been actively monitoring the Pueblo's federal funding sources and recent federal administrative changes. We continue to meet and communicate with the Pueblo's congressional representation to report on how the Pueblo is impacted by these changes at the federal level, including funding, the recent ICE situation, and other concerns.

On November 5, 2024, Tribal Council adopted Pueblo of Isleta Nuisance Code into Chapter 7 of the Land Use and Leasing Code. The Nuisance Code is now in effect. The code can be found online at www.isletapueblo.com underneath the Tribal Council tab for POI Regulations, Ordinances and Standards. Printed copies of the Code are also available at the Tribal Council Chambers, Isleta Police Department, the Tribal Court, and the Governor's Office. I have ordered our Code Compliance officer to issue notices to tribal members who are not in compliance with this order. If you do not comply with this order, you will be issued a fine or penalties.

I would also like to inform you that we are planning a community meeting to occur in April. Keep a look out for the postings of date and time around the community bulletin boards.

Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during the month of February. Ha-Wuh,

Order by the Governor Eugene Jiron:

This order serves as a formal notification that trespassing on Pueblo of Isleta lands particularly in the areas designated as cultural sites are strictly prohibited. Violators may be subject to penalties or prosecutions under Tribal Law. I ask you follow all signs placed at these scared areas and abided by this order.

see Tribal Law & Order Code 505-02-01 and 530-12-01 et.seq.

The Pueblo of Isleta is committed to preserving and protecting its rich cultural heritage, including numerous sacred and significant sites located within the Manzano Mountains, East and West side Range, Bosque area and Comanche Ranch. This prohibition applies to all ATVs/UTVs, Side-by-Side, and or any off roading vehicles. I am asking you not to create unauthorized roads or pathways. Unauthorized access and trespassing pose a serious threat to these sites, potentially causing irreparable damage and desecration.

I ask you help keep Isleta's historical and cultural sites preserved and report any violators to the Isleta Police Department at (505)869-3030.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for April Newsletter articles is set for Tuesday, March 18, 2025, at 4:30 pm Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel.Lujan@isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.



*Water quality samples are collected on a monthly basis from the Rio Grande. Two irrigation sample locations are collected during the growing season.

- Dash in data table indicates sample not collected. "MPN" is a unit of measure that stands for most probable number. MPN is equivalent to colony forming units ("CFU").

Environment collected water samples for ammonia at three locations on the Rio Grande 12/17/2024; all three samples were "non detect" for ammonia. Lieutenant at the time, now Governor Eugene Jiron reported there had been a sanitary system overflow in Rio Rancho. The estimated volume of the sewage spill on Sunday, December 8, 2024 was 168,000 gallons; the estimated volume reaching the Rio Grande was 72,000 gallons. The City of Rio Rancho reported the spill was caused by a leaking 14-inch force main. A local contractor was called out to repair the line.



EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE FUND

The Pueblo of Isleta recognizes the need to provide families with supplemental funding to assist their child/children in their education. Applications shall be reviewed the third week of January, March, June and September. The education-funding year shall reflect school year – August through July.

Through the Department of Education, specific guidelines have been developed to assist qualifying tribal members striving to reach high levels of district, local and state academic standards. These guidelines shall be used to provide monetary support to students and adults in need of educational assistance.

Assistance may be provided for the following categories: (Priority will be given to category A, then B and so forth).

Category:

- (A) Students K-12: Students who are in need of academic support, unavailable through other resources, for example; tutoring through Sylvan Learning Center or other programs.
- (B) Students K-12: Students with disabilities.
- (C) Students K-12: Students attending private institutions.
- (D) Students K-12: Students involved in extra-curricular activities, i.e., band, chess, sports activities, science fair, etc.
- (E) Group Trips: To give students K-12 the opportunity to attend and explore educational programs or take education trips outside the regular classroom.
- (F) Continuing Education: Special interest classes. i.e., career development, etc.
- (G) Adult Education Special Programs: Department of Education hosted programs to include CNM Ingenuity and UNM-VC concurrent courses classes.

Who May Apply:

All enrolled tribal members who reside within a 60-mile radius of Isleta Pueblo.

TRUANCY

Greetings,

We hope you are ready to spring forward into time change on March 9th, 2025. We all know the struggle of getting used to time change especially when it goes forward. Here are some tips to make it a little easier when time change happens.

- In the days before the time change, gradually adjust your bedtime and wakeup time by 15 minutes each day to ease the transition.
- Get outside in the morning to expose yourself to natural light, which helps regulate your body's natural rhythm.
- Stick to a regular sleep schedule, even on weekends, and create a relaxing bedtime routine.
- If you need to nap, keep them short and early in the day to avoid disrupting your nighttime sleep.
- Avoid caffeine close to bedtime as it can interfere with sleep.

As a reminder, our department has adopted a new Truancy Attendance for Success Law.

The Pueblo of Isleta has adopted a new Truancy Attendance for Success Law which outlines the steps of enforcement that will be implemented. It is important to understand this new law; feel free to contact the Truancy Department with any questions or concerns.

The following are the <u>Steps of Enforcement</u> that will be implemented:

Third Absence (3rd)

Upon determining that a child has three (3) unexcused absences, parent will be notified; first notification letter will be sent to the address on file. Truancy Coordinator shall inform parent/ guardian of the potential consequences of any additional unexcused absences.


Sixth Absence (6th)

Upon determining that a child has six (6) unexcused absences, parent will be notified immediately. Five (5) business days after the child's parent is contacted, an attendance review conference shall be scheduled and conducted; child and parent will then enter into an Attendance Contract.

Tenth Absence (10th)


Upon determining that a child has ten (10) unexcused absences and continues to accumulate unexcused absences, (within a school semester), and/or the parent has not contacted the Truancy Department to schedule an attendance conference, the Truancy Department shall recommend that a truancy petition be filed in Tribal Court.

March?! Already??? We hope everyone had an outstanding and safe St. Valentine's celebration and are looking forward to March with the exception of the proverbial

winds. The weather has been a bit of a roller coaster ride but welcome to New Mexico.

The winds are always problematic no matter the month and with that please use extra caution when traveling. The winds in the area can be treacherous and become quite dangerous while traveling, particularly on the interstate or if driving a "high profile vehicle".

9 Safety Tips for Driving in High Winds Defensive Driving.Org

Did you know high winds can have a devastating effect on road safety? In fact, over 1.2 million vehicle crashes a year are weather-related, including driving in high winds. When learning to drive, it's common not to experience any type of bad weather. As a result, new drivers can be caught off guard in the event of driving in high winds. They often don't know what to do, and this causes them to panic.

This kind of situation is hazardous, not only for them but for other road users. It increases the chance of a crash and can have a long-term effect on their confidence. So, it's important to know what to do whilst driving in windy conditions. If you have the knowledge and expertise required, then you can remain calm and stay safe.

1. Only Drive in High Winds if it's Urgent

It's common sense to realize that the best way to stay safe in extremely windy weather is not to drive at all. If there are high winds in your area, classed at around 40mph or more, don't travel.

If you're unsure about traveling, check local weather and news reports. Often, when there is bad weather, they advise you not to travel or only travel in an emergency. Emergency travel is usually classed as seeking medical help or escaping a dangerous situation. It shouldn't be to go to a grocery store, cinema, or other social events. You should also remember that if you do need emergency help, you're advised to call 911 immediately.

2. Plan Your Journey In Advance

If you are looking to go on a long journey out of town, plan your journey in advance if traveling across states, especially those within tornado alley which usually includes states such as:

- Texas
- Oklahoma
- Kansas
- South Dakota
- Illinois
- Missouri
- Indiana
- Ohio

High winds are common and tornados regularly occur in these states, so if planning travel in this area be prepared.

3. Slow Down

When we're in dangerous situations, sometimes our natural reaction is to escape quickly so when driving in a windstorm, some people try to get to their destination faster. This puts them in more danger and at a higher risk of crashing. Gusts of winds surround the car and affect the handling and braking and come in short and unpredictable bursts and catch drivers off guard. If this happens to you while driving at high speed, you'll have less time to react so slow down and you'll have more control of the car and be able to react more efficiently.

4. Adapt According to Your Vehicle

The best types of vehicles to drive in windy conditions are small sports coupes because they are more aerodynamic, meaning the wind can easily travel over them. Trucks and buses are the worst as they are blown around more easily by side winds. In fact, it's almost like being hit from the side by another vehicle. Plus, it's common for trucks to topple over in the most severe wind conditions, so we recommend parking somewhere safe if you are driving one. You can then wait until the conditions have eased before continuing.

This is also similar for motorcyclists as it can take far less wind to affect the bike's handling and knock you off balance. If you were to crash, you have very little protection and could be hit by another vehicle. So, you should avoid traveling at all in windy conditions.

Finally, if you are driving a 4×4 or saloon, be cautious. The car can still topple over or be knocked off the road. So, you should slow down and park somewhere safe.

5. Anticipate Winds

If you are about to go from a protected area, like a tunnel, and into an open space, be prepared for sudden gusts. They can catch you off guard and easily cause a crash. So before approaching, slow down significantly so you can stay in control of your vehicle and stay safe. You'll also help protect other drivers behind you as they'll follow your lead.

6. Be Cautious When Overtaking

Ideally, you want to avoid overtaking other vehicles, but sometimes this is unavoidable. So, when overtaking trucks, buses, motorbikes, and even cyclists, give them a wide berth. We've already established trucks, buses, and motorbikes are most at risk from high winds. If a bus or truck was to be blown over onto your vehicle, it could be fatal. When overtaking, stay as far away from them as possible. If the worst did happen, your vehicle would have more chance of not being hit. In terms of motorcyclists and pushbike users, just do the same and could be thrown into your vehicle's path. If you were to hit them, it could have devastating consequences and finally, as you are just about to overtake the large vehicles, anticipate side winds. You'll no longer have the protection of the bus or truck so approach it as you would exiting a tunnel.

7. Be Aware of Falling Debris

If you are driving in a forest or the countryside, you need to constantly be on the lookout for falling trees, branches and as they can cause severe accidents. In fact, people have been killed by fallen trees but they don't have to hit you directly to be dangerous. They can fall into the road and cause a road hazard. This is especially dangerous at night or in foggy conditions because they are hard to notice. So, if you hit one at high speed, you're likely to suffer severe injuries. Slow down and ensure your lights are on. If a tree or branch is overhanging, then try to avoid traveling underneath it.

Finally, also look out for falling roof tiles and electricity poles as well as objects flying through the air. Damage to these is common during storms; always stay alert.

8. Hold the Steering Wheel Correctly

Most of us are guilty of driving with one hand on the steering wheel sometimes, but you should never do this when driving in a heavy storm. Instead, imagine the steering wheel is a clock face and place your hands at 10 and 2 as this gives you full control of the vehicle and allows you to react in the event of a sudden gust of wind.

9. Be Careful When You Park

If you need to park somewhere (and we recommend you do during heavy winds), park somewhere safe.

Do not park:

- Near cliff edges
- Near ditches
- Underneath trees or large poles

Be careful when you exit your vehicle, as winds can come in any direction and may cause you to fall or slam the door into you.
















March is Colic Awareness Month

What is colic?

Colic can occur when a baby is 4 months or younger. It is characterized by extended periods of crying. It usually happens in the evening and involves intense crying and fussiness. No one is sure why this happens. There are factors that might play a role in the infant. These include gas, underdeveloped digestive system, allergies, reflux, over/underfeeding, and excitement or fear.

Symptoms can include:

Hard abdomen Gas Clenched Fists Skin Flushing Stiff Limbs

Treatment

Switch baby's formula to see if that helps and keep a diary of foods if breastfeeding. Make sure they are not hungry. Swaddle baby or rock them for comfort. Massage may help baby's tummy with hardness and gas. Take baby to the doctor to rule out other medical issues. Colic usually subsides around 4 months of age.

Isleta Health Center Community Update on Measles Outbreak

We want to keep our community informed about the ongoing measles outbreak in Lea County, NM and provide steps to protect yourselves and your loved ones. The New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) reports that three Lea County residents tested positive for measles in February. These are New Mexico's first measles cases since 2024, with two cases reported last year. Prior to last year, the last cases in the state were in 2021. Measles is highly contagious, but vaccination is the most effective way to prevent it. We strongly encourage everyone to ensure they are up-to-date on their MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine, especially children and those who have not received the full series.

Vaccination matters:

- The measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine works very well making it far less likely for you to get measles than someone unvaccinated with no immunity. Those born before 1957 are already immune.
- High-risk adults (college students, healthcare personnel, and international travelers) need two doses of MMR.
- Vaccination provides strong protection; however, if you are vaccinated and develop symptoms after exposure, consult a healthcare provider. Most adults vaccinated as children are presumed to be immune.
- Children should receive two doses: one each at 12-months and four years old.

Symptoms and risks:


- Symptoms can appear 7 to 21 days after exposure
- Symptoms of measles include fever, cough, runny nose, and red eyes, followed by a red spotted rash that usually starts on the head or face and spreads downward across the body.
- Complications can include diarrhea, ear infections, and pneumonia.
- About one in five unvaccinated people in the United States who get measles is hospitalized.

If you or your family members have symptoms like a high fever, cough, or a distinctive red rash, please seek medical attention immediately and avoid contact with others to prevent the spread.



PROPERLY BAGGED RECYCLABLES

- Use clear bags only if you choose to bag your recyclables.
- Why? When it gets to the recycle facility the line workers can distinguish recycle materials from trash ensuring your materials get recycled.
- Using clear bags helps ensure the health & safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the facility.
- Use of colored bags will result in missed collections.

WINDY SEASON & RECYCLING

Let's Talk Trash Isleta! It is that time of the year, windy season. The Solid Waste Department wants to remind you to expect early closures at the Transfer Station on very high wind days. We ask that you please do not come to the Transfer Station on very high wind days as we may close early. We do this for safety reasons as well as to KEEP ISLETA BEAUTIFUL. Lots of times trash is blown out of vehicles during transport and it litters our community and pollutes our range lands. Poor visibility and dust can impair vision and cause damage to your eyes leading to accidents or injuries. This precaution is taken for your safety and community in mind.

Please bag all trash for curbside pickup. Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility and results in your material being landfilled instead of recycled. Using colored bags will result in your recycles not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Keep it simple, if you do not see it on the picture above throw it away in the trash. Do not use your blue cart for trash or it will be confiscated. Have carts out by 7am. For service schedule announcements check the POI newsletter & POI Facebook. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.

National Nutrition Month

What is National Nutrition Month?

National Nutrition Month is an annual campaign held every March. It helps people learn about the importance of healthy eating and physical activity. It was started in 1973 by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, an organization of nutrition professionals.1 The theme for 2025 is "Food Connects Us." Four connections will be explored this year1:

- 1. Connect with food cooking, where your food comes from, local food banks, etc.
- 2. Connect with a nutrition expert ask for a referral to an RDN.
- 3. Connect food with culture include favorite culture foods, enjoy meals with family, etc.
- 4. Connect food across all life stages how needs change between age groups.

Why is nutrition important?

Nutrition plays a role in every aspect of our lives. Good nutrition helps us feel better, sleep well, and perform daily activities more efficiently. Recent research supports eating fewer ultra-processed foods. 2 These are defined as foods which are made with ingredients you cannot buy in the store. 2 Eating fewer ultra-processed foods can reduce risk of developing diabetes and heart disease. 2 Emphasize foods which resemble what they look like in nature. For example, choose a whole apple instead of bottled apple juice.




